- In the interim, the Multiparty Interim Appeal Arbitration Arrangement (MPIA) is a pragmatic and effective response to the immediate need for a functioning dispute settlement process. The MPIA offers participating Members access to a reliable and impartial appeal mechanism during this transitional phase. We encourage interested Members to join the MPIA before the Appellate Body resumes its operation.
- We look forward to continuing our constructive engagement with all Members as we work collectively towards restoring a fully operational and inclusive dispute settlement system that serves the interests of the entire membership.
- Last but not least, we wish to thank you, Ambassador Saqer Abdullah Almoqbel for your leadership in the past year as the Chair of the DSB and also congratulate on your new role as the GC Chair. Meanwhile, we would also like to congratulate Ambassador Clare Kelly of New Zealand on her taking up as the Chair of the DSB. We look forward to working under the guidance of both of you in the coming year.
